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
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Thank you Shenandoah Lodge. 258 truly is great!

What a great weekend for Cub Scouts at the April 23-24 Aviation Day in the

Monticello District! In attendance were over 600 Cub Scouts and their families. It was a success, thanks in part, to the Gordonsville Town Council, Troop 12, the Gordonsville Chapter of the Experimental Aircraft Association, the Irby family and countless volunteers that stepped up to help. Aviation Day could not have taken place without the sponsored support of the Talbert and Bright Engineering and Planning Consultants, Reynolds Auto of Orange, and the Virginia Department of Aviation.

Organizations that hosted activities or exhibits at Aviation Day included the Virginia Department of Aviation, Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum, UVA Department of Astronomy, the Experimental Aircraft Association, Charlottesville Astronomical Society, Skydive Orange, Orange County High School Robotics Team, Talbert & Bright Engineering, Air Force ROTC, and numerous pilots. Volunteers from Troop 12, Troop 14, and Troop 2020 led activities that were both fun for all and helped Wolf Scouts earn the Air of the Wolf achievement.

Cub Scouts participated in nose cone experiments with the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum, the viewing of sunspots and solar flares through a solar telescope, operating robots, making paper airplanes and experimenting with how minor adjustments can alter the way they fly, tests with air pressure and propulsion, and other aviation and STEM-related activities. The addition of STEM activities, particularly those associated with the NOVA Science is

Everywhere award, were especially popular among older Cub Scouts. Four Cub Scouts won raffles for open cockpit biplane rides that took place during the event. In the evening, Cub Scouts attended a presentation in an inflatable planetarium hosted by the Dark Skies, Bright Kids program of the UVA Department of Astronomy. They also had the opportunity to participate in a tour of constellations and fly rocket copters. A parent commented on Facebook that "It was an awesome event! 

Get those med forms completed and in before Summer Camp to make the whole process easier on the troop and scout family too. Trying to get a last minute doctor appointment isn't fun.

Does your troop have any scouts with special needs other than allergy concerns? Any physical limitations? Need for specialized equipment?

Do you have any scouts that have ADD/ADHD, on the autism spectrum or some other identified issue that needs to be addressed? Do you have enough info from the scout, their family or medical provider to work with their personal situation/needs?

Personally, I believe every scout has special needs. Not every scout can complete the same merit badge at the same age or rank.

While our first aid kit has numerous components so does leadership in the troop.

Please get all the gear you need organized, get your scouts organized and be ready for the various things that will go off plan.


NYLT is a six-day course. Content is delivered in a troop and patrol outdoor setting with an emphasis on immediate application of learning in a fun environment.

- Every Scout, Leader and Parent must complete the Scouts BSA Swim Classification Test annually if they will be participating in aquatics activities at Webelos or Scouts BSA Resident Camp, SeaBase high adventures, or during unit outings
- Camp Shenandoah and other Scouts BSA summer camps highly recommend Scouts and leaders complete swim checks prior to arrival at camp as a massive time-saver at check-in. Unit swim test rosters and results will be compiled and e-mailed to unit leaders to bring to camp, Sea Base, unit outings, etc.
- The Scouts BSA Swim Check is administered by the VAHC Aquatics Committee to determine one of two swimming ability classifications as follows:
 - Beginner Jump feet first into water over the head, level off, and begin swimming. Swim 25 feet on the surface. Stop, turn, and resume swimming back to the starting place.
 - Swimmer Jump feet first into water over the head, level off, and begin swimming. Swim 75 yards in a strong manner using one or more of the following strokes: side, breast, trudgen, or crawl. Swim 25 yards using an easy, resting backstroke. Afterwards, rest for a minute by floating.
- Check in with the YMCA main desk at the front entrance, and you will receive directions to the pool area on the lower level. Locker rooms are available. Completing the Swim Check takes only a few minutes, we will run 2 per lane.
- Directions:
 - From the West, Rt 250 travelling East, exit to McIntire Park onto Rugby Road. Turn left to pass under Rt 250. Parking is in front of the YMCA building.
 - From the East, Rt 250 travelling West. Exit directly into McIntire Park at sign for park. Parking is in front of the YMCA building.
